

DEVOURED BY A SHARK.

The remains of John Ogier, the missing deckhand of the steamer Halcyon, have been recovered in Kerosine Bay. His back, spine, and pelvis were all that remained, sharks having mutilated his body in u frightful manner. Many large monsters have been seen in the harbor lately. It is believed that while sitting on a rail and trailing his feet over the side a shark seized him by the foot and dragged him into the water, afterwards devouring him.

The River Tragedy.

Devoured by Sharks.

At about half-past 5 o'clock on Wednesday evening, the Water Police recovered the body of John Ogier, 31, who fell overboard from the Parramatta River steamer Halcyon on the morning of the 15th instant. Ogier was not seen to fall overboard, but was on the vessel when she left Sydney, and was missed at Longnose Point. The body was found in Kerosene Bay. Ogier was a married man, and resided at Short-street, Hunter's Hill.

The ribs, breast-bone, head, limbs, and contents of the trunk were missing, the back, spine, and pelvis being all that remained of a man. It is surmised by others who were employed on the boat that the man slipped or overbalanced, and that he was attacked and devoured by sharks.

The water police state that Port Jackson and the Parramatta River are swarming with sharks, and that the waters are full of gigantic and frightful monsters.
