In the opinion of Mr. Cohen, P.M., who conducted an inquiry into the disappearance of Monte Robinson and Andrew McNeill, both aged 17 years, while fishing in the bay off Carrum in April, 1916, the boys were seized by sharks while clinging to their overturned rowing-boat. report which Mr. Cohen has presented to the Governor (Sir Arthur Stanley), through the Premier, he states that the evidence before him showed that when the Ports and Harbour officials were notified of the disappearance of the boys on April 3 they provided boats to conduct a search, but it was then too late. Cohen, for the police to communicate with the Ports and Harbours branch, and arrange for a launch to search the scene of the disaster, and for the police to procure a boat themselves from district tishermen.
