HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL NOTEBOOK: A shark's tale for Hapworth

Dylan Hapworth, Winslow High School's freshman shortstop, went on a family vacation to Sanibel Island, Florida, a few weeks ago. He came back with a scar, and an interesting story to share with his friends.

While swimming in the Atlantic Ocean, Hapworth was bitten on the leg by a small shark.

"I was swimming maybe 15, 20 feet out, and it got me, I guess," Hapworth, who also pitches for the Black Raiders, said. "I got out of the water and I had a big gash in my leg."

At first, Hapworth didn't know he'd been bitten by a shark. He didn't get a good look at the animal. The doctor who stitched his leg up recognized the wound as a shark bite.

"At first I thought it was a crab," Hapworth said.

It took eight stitches to close the wound, Hapworth said, showing off the pink scar near his right shin. Hapworth said he'll probably go back in the ocean.
